1	End of Year 6 data shows a significant gap between disadvantaged and non-disadvantaged Foxmoor pupils in writing
2	Internal data shows that there is a significant gap in the percentage of children who are on track to meet the expected standard in writing between disadvantaged and non-disadvantaged children
3	Analysis of attendance data shows that the percentage of disadvantaged pupils who are classed as persistently absent is significantly above non-disadvantaged pupils
4	Parental engagement with their children's learning and support for disadvantaged children at home
